A local chorus (including our own Pennie Ingram) ably supported these superbly talented professionals.

## Ruddigore at Wilton's Music Hall

If you didn't get a chance to see Ruddigore a few weeks ago, you missed a great experience. Wilton's is a beautifully restored old Victorian venue, which provided the ideal setting for an atmospheric performance which was aided by eerie lighting. The opera was played with a cast of just 13 with some of the chorus even running to the "pit" to play an instrument or two. It was given an updated feel with some contemporary references but done so with much love, understanding and respect that even an old traditionalist like myself felt it was one of the best Ruddigores (if not the best) that I had ever seen. There were some stunning performances with a very high standard of both singing and acting being maintained throughout the work.

Tickets will go on sale in June or July but Society members will be notified well in advance of the box office opening so keep this date free.
